THE SECOND BEATITUDE

"Blessed are they that mourn: for they shall be comforted." Matthew 5:4.

The first two beatitudes give us the feeling of a child of God when he is occupied with himself: He is poor in spirit and mourning over his sins. They give us the result of the inward and backward look; not of the upward and forward look at Christ. The believer has no confidence in himself, but rejoices in Christ. The beatitudes give us the characteristics of the saints; they are the birth marks of the saved.

The first two beatitudes are paired. The first is a benediction upon those who are filled with a sense of unworthiness: the second gives us the emotional experience of those who are poor in spirit. The poor in spirit are the mourners of the second beatitude. The first gives us the saint's estimate of himself; the second the feeling that follows upon that estimate. We have the first exemplified in Isaiah's "I am a man of unclean lips"; the second in his contemporaneous wait: "Woe is me, for I am undone."

ALL MOURNERS ARE NOT BLESSED

"Blessed are they that mourn." Are all mourners blessed? If so, then all men are blessed for everybody is a mourner at one time or another. It is nothing but shallow sentimentalism that teaches that all mourners are blessed and will be comforted. There are many mourners who are not blessed and will never know the comfort of the second beatitude. This second beatitude does not support the doctrine of universal bliss. One may mourn over blighted hopes, frustrated plans, financial reverses, and death of loved ones, and yet not be blessed of God. There are many mourners who will never be comforted.

What kind of mourning is this? There are three kinds of mourning referred to in the Bible. There is a natural mourning resulting from present afflictions, Such as loss of health, or wealth, or a dear relative. Then there is sinful mourning, which is inordinate grief, refusing to be comforted, or hopeless remorse such as Judas had. And there is also gracious or godly sorrow, of which the

Holy Spirit is the Author. The mourning of our text is a gracious and spiritual mourning over sin. Grace in the soul not only makes one poor in spirit; it also makes sin a thing of grief

Spiritual mourning is not the result of being caught in sin by man, but the result of realizing we are sinners before God. The spiritual mourner says "Against Thee, and Thee only have I sinned and done this evil in thy sight." We must distinguish between sin against God and crime against man. All are sinners but all are not criminals. Crime is against society; sin is against God. Society punishes for crime; only God punishes sin. A man may even deny there is any God and human law will not punish him. All are not in jail, but all are in the prison house of sin. All are not facing indictment by the grand jury, but all out of Christ are exposed to the wrath of God. Crime against man is bad; sin against God is worse. All sin is not crime, but all crime is also sin against God.

Spiritual mourning is a part of the process of conversion. It is mourning that

goes with conviction for sin and repentance unto life. The Holy Spirit is the Author of this mourning. He plows and harrows the heart before He plants the gospel seed that brings forth faith and joy in Christ. When the Spirit works there is a stripping before clothing, wounding before healing, abasing before exalting, and grief before gladness. The Holy Spirit makes the sinner despair of himself before He gives him the good hope in Christ. In an experience of grace there is a bad feeling before a good feeling. The bad feeling is the result of a sight of sin, the good feeling is the result of a sight of Him. In dealing with the woman at the well Jesus made her realize she was a sinner, before He revealed Himself as her Saviour. Christ cannot be precious unless and until sin is bitter.

I am not insisting on any stereotyped experience in conversion. I am not saying that there must be a definitely defined depth of sorrow or any protracted season of grief. I am not preaching sorrow or mourning as a price for salvation. What I do insist upon is that repentance for sin must go before faith in Christ. There must be godly sorrow for sin before there can be forgiveness of sin. There must be a real sense of sin before salvation can even be desired. Many will admit they are sinners who have never mourned the fact--they have never really taken it to heart, it has never caused them any great concern. The woman of Luke 7 washed the Saviours feet with her tears because she realized she had been forgiven much. Have you and I ever shed any tears over our sins? How can there be real rejoicing in Christ unless there has been real sorrow for sin. How can Christ be

precious as Saviour unless sin has been bitter? How can one see Christ as Redeemer unless he has seen himself as lost so undone? When the prodigal returned to his fathers house, he said, "I have sinned against heaven and in thy sight and am no more worthy to be called thy son." Have we ever had such a sense of our unworthiness? Why did the publican smite his breast and say, "God be merciful to me a sinner." It was because he felt the plague of his own heart. How was it with the thirty thousand on the day of Pentecost? They were pricked in their hearts and cried out, "What must we do?" How was it with the jailor? With fear and trembling he asked, "What must I do to be saved?"

In an experience of grace the only thing that can comfort is a sight of Jesus Christ putting away sin by the sacrifice of himself. The only hope of any spirit convicted sinner is that Christ bare his sins in His own body on the cross. To have our guilty fears quieted by any other means is a dangerous delusion. "As sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing all things." II Corinthians 6:10.

Blessed are they that mourn for they shall be comforted." Our Text is not to be limited to the initial experience of conviction and contrition. The verb denotes a present and continuous experience. It is not "blessed are they that have mourned," But "blessed are they that mourn." Here is another birthmark of the saved. Those in the kingdom are mourners. I have mourned over my sins more since I became a Christian than before. The believer has much to mourn over, such as coldness of heart, listlessness in prayer, neglect of the word, and failure to give


Christ chief place in our lives.

Conversion is an experience the real believer never gets over; he continues as he began. Every element in conversion is sustained and deepened with the passing days. Was there realization of sin when we were saved? Then it is still there and as we grow in grace we make deeper discoveries of the sinful nature that is in us and cry with pain. "I know that in me, that is in my flesh, dwelleth no good thing." Was there hatred of sin in our conversion? Then this hatred continues and is intensified. Was there sorrow for sin? Then this sorrow is still felt and we so often cry "O wretched man that I am." Was there faith in Christ when we were saved? then this faith has remained and is more intelligent. Was there satisfaction with Christ and what He paid for our salvation? Then we are still satisfied with Him and have no desire to look to any other source for salvation.

WE WILL NOT ALWAYS HAVE TO MOURN

"Blessed are the mourners: for they shall be comforted." When we awake in His likeness, then we shall be satisfied and sorrow shall be gone forever. When we are finally conformed to the image of Christ and are safely settled and housed in the New Jerusalem, God shall wipe all our tears away, and there will be no mourning anymore.

and Sister Doris:


